### Goal: To teach your child to use the word 'is' correctly

The word 'is', is amongst the earliest of the grammatical words a child will begin to use. Children will generally learn its full form 'is', before they use its contracted form 's' for example: "the dog is jumping" contracted form: "the dog's jumping". Don't be concerned if your child uses only the contracted form as this is a more natural way of using the word 'is'.

#### Activities to increase your child's use of 'is':

Many children will begin stringing two words together without the use of 'is' for example: "me running". By encouraging your child to use the word 'is' your child will begin to form sentences better sentences, for example: "me is running". At this early stage you don't need to worry about the use of "me" instead of "I" as your child will learn this later (3 - 31/2 years). Also make sure you only concentrate on one new grammar structure at a time so your child learns it as quickly as possible without getting too confused.

Use the following technique to increase your child's use of 'is':

• Recasting the correct form – If your child is leaving out the word 'is', repeat (recast) the correct way of saying it for them without criticising what they have said.

e.g. Child: "The dog jumping"

Adult: "The dog is jumping"

Ensure you give lots of repetitions and emphasize the correct word e.g.

Adult: "The dog is jumping over the fence, he is jumping the fence."

Use this technique in the following activities:

#### Books and pictures:

Choose a book to read with your child, or a picture to describe and pick out things about the picture/book you can talk about. Emphasize the use of the word 'is' e.g. "Look the bird <u>is</u> in the tree", "The lady <u>is</u> making a cake".

#### Photographs/ action pictures:


Use family photo graphs or pictures out of a magazine of people doing things (actions) and talk about them e.g. "Look, mum <u>is</u> jumping" "Your sister <u>is</u> skipping".

#### Name that sound:

Use tapes of animal sounds, or musical instruments and ask your child to 'name that sound' e.g. Adult: "What is making that sound?" Child "A pig is


